"Masks"

A Reflection by Aren Alberico

Happy October and Happy Fall! In the spirit of Halloween, I thought I would talk about masks. Not the ones we had to wear for just over two years, or the creepy ones you can find at the Halloween store. No, I'm talking about the social devices that we, as people, use to conceal the most vulnerable parts of our own identity. Whether we are hiding scars from our past experiences, facets of ourselves that we don't think other people will like, or fears and insecurities that we hold close to ourselves; when we wear a mask, we conceal our true natures from the world. The fact is that each of us has worn a mask at least once in our lives. Whether it be for something minor like a guilty pleasure or for something major like trauma, we each want to conceal some part of our identity from the world in fear of judgment. Masks can be our way of getting by, of trying to survive in a world that can, at times, be cruel and malignant. Masks can be our way of ignoring a problem that we don't believe we can solve by ourselves. Masks can be a way of shielding ourselves from feeling like we have value.

When I reflect on this topic, I feel myself drawn to the example of Bruce Wayne, who is better known as Batman. Although Bruce is a billionaire philanthropist, he has undergone a lot of traumas in his personal life that has caused him to feel weak, scared, and unable to protect anything he holds dear, let alone himself. However, when he dons the mask and cape of the Batman, he becomes a hero strong enough to take down supervillains that far outclass him. Like superheroes, we use masks to conceal our identities from the world, and to give ourselves a sense of strength. However, like superheroes, our masks do not make up who we are, and masks do not give us true strength. There is a saying from Batman that goes, "It's not who you are underneath; it's what you do that defines you". It is not the cape or cowl that makes Bruce a hero; neither is it his fears or insecurities. Rather, it is his intellect, his courage, and his never-ending pursuit of justice that gives him the strength to overcome any obstacle that comes his way.

In order to achieve true strength like Bruce, we need to examine and confront what lies behind our masks. Acknowledging our faults and shortcomings, and further, facing them head on, helps us to understand our own strength and the strength that God has given us through the power of the Holy Spirit. Only through examining ourselves thoroughly can we love ourselves as God loves us and love others as Jesus has asked us to do. In his letter to the Ephesians, the Apostle Paul states that, "For once you were darkness, but now in the Lord you are light. Live as children of light" (Ephesians 5:8). In other words, Paul is urging us to embrace all that we are, the good and the bad, and to live as authentically as we can. Not only that, but he is also asking for us to go forth as children of light, to embrace the Holy Spirit within us in order to bring our light to others.

I like to end my reflections with a challenge, and this is no different. My challenge for you is to smile at someone today. That's it, just smile. Smile at a stranger, smile at a friend, smile at the person next to you right now! Smile at yourself in the mirror! That smile, though a small, seemingly insignificant gesture, could very well make a difference in someone's life. Sometimes, that's all someone needs: a glimmer of light in the darkness. By smiling at someone, you can let them know that they are not alone, that they are worth something. A smile from a stranger can make someone feel appreciated and validated, and we all need that validation, don't we? That validation that comes from another person looking at you through your mask and still caring despite the flaws or imperfections that we perceive ourselves to have. I encourage you to be that person for someone else, to be the rainbow in someone else's cloud.


