From the Pastor's Desk...

Greetings!

Happy almost October. Below are a few somewhat-related events and thoughts.

The newsletter is a bit early this month, in part, so that the details about my installation service get to you once again. It will take place in our sanctuary on Sunday, October 1st at 2:00 PM. We will also livestream it if you are not able to be here in person. Though the "installing" me makes it sound like I am a major appliance, there is important theology behind the idea. Hear these words from the UCC website:

In our faith tradition, we don't refer to positions that ministers fill as jobs, but as calls. Those of us who engage in ministry talk about receiving a call. There is something deeply and profoundly sacred about this. We do believe that the Holy Spirit is an engaged partner in the unfolding life, health, and vitality of the Church...The service of Installation is more than just saying to someone, "This is your new job – do it well." It is a way of affirming the movement of a Holy Spirit who participated with us in the process, and who called THIS leader to THIS place for THIS time.

It is taking time to build an altar of remembrance for something we already know is true: God has called us to share this next chapter of life together—and I am deeply grateful.

I will be away for two Sundays during October and one in November. On October 8th, Antonio Vargas, a Yale Divinity Student, will be preaching. On October 22nd, our own Aren Alberico will be leading in the service. On November 5th, another YDS student, Lauren Maxwell, will be preaching. I appreciate their willingness to help out.

All Saints Day is November 1st and is usually celebrated on the first Sunday in November. Since I am going to be gone that day and did not want to miss that celebration, our service on October 29th will be our All Saints service. We will also observe Communion that Sunday instead of November 5th since the idea of the Communion of the Saints is so connected to our most sacred meal.

Stewardship: Getting Things in Order

One of my favorite cookbooks is Michael Ruhlman's Ratio: The Simple Codes Behind the Craft of Cooking. That's an odd way to begin an article on stewardship but stick with me.

Ruhlman's basic premise is that ratios—the relationship between ingredients—are the key to cooking, alongside of technique. If you can grasp how things go together, you can learn how to cook. In his section on baking, however, he makes another observation that is illuminating.

Pound cake is perhaps the best-known recipe called by its ratio. One pound each of butter, sugar, egg, and flour are combined using the creaming method, whipping the butter and sugar together first. But a perfect sponge cake can be achieved with those exact ingredients, if you use the foaming method, whipping the eggs and sugar together first.

It's not just what is in the cake, but the order in which the ingredients are added that changes the outcome.

The elements of a stewardship drive are simple, much like a pound cake: budget requirements, ministry needs, trust (in God and in one another), generosity, joy, responsibility. Like Ruhlman's cake example, the order in which the ingredients are added has a profound effect on the outcome.

To start by mixing the needs of the budget with our responsibility to help pay the bills may get us to our goal, but we can easily lose any flavor of joy or generosity. Making our pledge to the church falls right in with what we pledge to NPR or the fees we pay Park and Rec to play pickelball. We end up with something that tastes like the cost of doing business.

If we begin with the joy of the ministries we hope to foster, and the generosity of sharing our resources with one another, we are still paying the bills and keeping our promises, but we also get a taste of the church as a web of relationships rather than an organization of which we are members, and we end up with something that tastes like belonging.

As we contemplate our recipe for stewardship, it's worth double-checking the order in which we add our ingredients so that we can bake up a big batch of joy and generosity in the process of keeping our financial promises. When Paul wrote his stewardship letter to the church in Corinth he said, "Everyone should give whatever they have decided in their heart. They shouldn't give with hesitation or because of pressure. God loves a cheerful giver." (2 Cor. 9:7 CEB)

God loves a grumpy giver, too; the love of God is not at stake here. What is on the line is how we can best order our lives to feel that love most fully. If we start by mixing joy and generosity and then adding trust, we will always have enough to go around.




A Boat Ride to Hide From God


Books of the Bible
