From the Pastor's Desk...

Dear Church Family,

As most of you know, I am spending the month of June in Northern Ireland. My dear friends Gareth Higgins and Brian Ammons lead a number of peace retreats each summer and fall (www.irelandretreats.com) and have invited me to be the chef for two of them this month. I received the invitation about the same time I began filling in here at Mount Carmel in January. I will be preparing meals for about thirty people in each retreat and will have a few days between them to do some exploring of my own.

In my absence, Ginger Brasher-Cunningham, my wife and Lead Pastor at First Congregational Church in Guilford, will be covering for me if there are pastoral care needs. Please reach out to Aren and he will put you in touch with her. We have two students from Yale Divinity School who will be preaching—Rachel Sauls, 6/4 and Jackson Ringley, 6/11—as well as Rick Terry on 6/18 and Aren Alberico on 6/25. I will be back in the office on June 29th and in worship on July 2nd.

We are moving into the season of the church year we call Ordinary Time, which is another name for the season between Pentecost and Advent. The word "ordinary" here does not mean "routine" or "not special." Instead, it refers to the "ordinal numbers" (first, second, third, etc.) used to name and count the Sundays (such as the Third Sunday after Pentecost). This term comes from the Latin *ordinalis*, which means "numbered" or "ordered." In short, it's the churchy way of telling time.

In July and August, I am going to step away from the Revised Common Lectionary for my sermon texts and do a short series of sermons on the Lord's Prayer. We will begin by looking at what it means to pray and then take each phrase of the prayer and expand on them a bit. We will also look at variations of the prayer that people have offered over time. I am hopeful that it will be a meaningful journey.

Summer is a relaxing time for many, and vacation time for most. If you are traveling this summer, for whatever reason, or if you are staying home, I hope the days are full of hope and meaning for you. And let's stay connected.



Destination Unknown


(Genesis 11:27–31; 12:1–10,16; 13:1–5; 17:5; Acts 7:2–4)



Twelve Traveling Preachers



Usually, the apostles traveled with Jesus. In the verses below, Jesus sends them out in pairs to preach the gospel and heal the sick. He gave them special instructions about what they should do. Use the Bible verses listed below to underline the correct answer.

A. Jesus' Instructions to His Apostles (Matthew 10:5-16)


- 1. Go only to the lost sheep of (the meadows; Israel).
- 2. Preach that (the kingdom of heaven is near; a flood is coming).
- Heal the (sick; beggars), raise the (roof; dead), cleanse the (lepers; dirty feet), drive out (cattle; demons).
- 4. Do not take any (gold, silver, or copper; knives, guns, or bullets) in your belts.
- 5. Take no extra (food and drink; clothes and sandals) for your journey.
- Whatever town you enter, search for (the best inn; some worthy person's home) and stay there until you leave town.
- If no one will welcome you or listen to your words, shake the dust off (their rugs; your feet) when you leave.
- 8. I am sending you out like (sheep; children) among (lions; wolves). Be as shrewd as (snakes; foxes) and as harmless as (crows; doves).



B. What the Apostles Did (Mark 6:12–13)

- They preached that people should (wash their feet; repent).
- They drove out many (sheep; demons).
- They anointed people with (oil; perfume) and (praised; healed) them.
